



McAllister Origins




Barnabas McAllister lived in Scotland went to America via Gibraltar. He started a wagon hauling business and worked his way to Aberdeen, Miss where he settled. His wife was from Ireland, born on the journey across the Atlantic to America. He had a total of 14 children. The only records we have are the following: James DeWitt- Born in S.C. November 16, 1802-1891 who married Mary C. Fleming (1809-1870) on July 8, 1836) They adopted a daughter Mary Anna Ligou born 1840 in Alabama Ulysses- Born in S.C. January 20, 1807-August 19, 1880 (married Sarah Frances Fortson (1818-1897) on July 18, 1836) They had two children: John N. (1838-1862) he died in the Civil War and Mary Eugenia (1842-1905). She married Edward J. Higgason and they had four children all born in Monroe, Miss.: George Ulysses, J.McAllister, Edmonia, Burgess Burkett. Barnabas G.-Born in Bedford, Tenn 1816; Hugh Wilson- Born in Bedford, Tenn in 1811- (married Elizabeth A. Holland from Kentucky in1857) They had three children: Sarah Elizabeth, B. R. (male) and Stella Wilson.

Eliza McAllister



Eliza was a slave owned by De Witt. She was light-skinned and from the Islands. She was part Spanish and part Indian. She was brought to Mississippi from Virginia. After giving birth to Lopez at 14 years old, she was sold. She had been the seamstress and cook and had lived in a house in the yard. She was almost white.

Rev. Lopez D. Santa Anna McAllister (1849 -1932) Lopez was the son of James De Witt McAllister and Eliza.

Rev. Lopez Desceante Santa Anna McAllister


Rev. Lopez D. Santa Anna McAllister (1849 -1932) Lopez was the son of James D. McAllister and a slave named Eliza. Lopez was raised by the wet nurse in the house of James D. McAllister and treated as his son. He did not know he was part Negro and that he was a slave. Lopez was educated in a school in Aberdeen with white children. He was first made aware that he was part Negro when the war ended and his mother returned and claimed him. He was thus torn between two families. Lopez was sent to school in Maine. He married a black girl when he returned to Mississippi. Her name was Emmaline Thompson, the sister of H. Mark Thompson. The Thompson's had a lot of Indian blood and it showed in their fine features. Lopez meet his wife when he taught her in school. Many Negro's were jealous of Lopez' white connections; from a photograph you cannot tell he was part Negro. Lopez preached in Baptist churches. He taught in the county. He retired some years before his death. He was never a robust man. After the tornado destroyed his house in April 20,1920 in Aberdeen ,he moved into the Ville (Baptistville). Lopez died in the Spring of 1932. At his funeral there were as many whites as there were Negroes. Mary Anna McAllister Jordan (Lopez adopted sister) wept and said, "I've lost my only brother". (this information retrieved from a telephone conversation with Mrs. Orlean Ricco of Pittsburgh, Pa in 1979, daughter of Sarah McAllister and granddaughter of Lopez McAllister)



Emmaline Thompson



Emmaline Thompson's parents were Henry Thompson (1812) and Harriet Reynolds (1827-1878) who lived near Aberdeen. She was half Choctaw Indian. The Thompson's had 11 children: Harry, Edmund, Emmaline, King McFarland, George S. Well, Margaret, Eliza, Maria, Jefferson, Isaiah, and John Marshall. Emmaline's grandparents were Harry Thompson (1760's-) and Violet (1770-1867) from Richmond, VA and Phillip Reynolds (1775-1867) and Siney (1780-)

William Norman McAllister 1885 - 1966



Attended school in Memphis, Tenn, and was a classmate of Mordecai Johnson. After graduating he began teaching in the schools of Aberdeen, Miss. He visited the Word's Fair in St. Louis (1944) and decided to remain in the city. He began working as a Pullman Porter and Dining Car Waiter until he took the Postal Service Exam for railway clerk. Promoted to clerk in charge in 1920 and he remained in that position until 1951. He remained in St. Louis until his death in 1966. Married in 1922, he was the father of two children, William A. and Elizabeth.

Hosea McAllister 1894 - 1973



Hosea - Youngest child of Lopez and Emma. Born 1894-1973 in Queens, N.Y. (Florence last of 3 wives) Migrated to NY City at an early age and became a sleeping car port and was very active in forming the sleeping car porter's union with A. Philip Randolph. He attended Meharry Medical College for 3 years before returning to New York to become the First Black Motorman. He subsequently taught others operational techniques and thus more blacks were hired. (See museum on Hall of Fame in NYC). He was affectionately known as "Mac" and was very good looking. Some of his close friends were Count Basie, Duke Ellington, and more. Hosea left a legacy as he had 3 wives and 13 children. (Oral History given by his daughter Alice)

Clifton Lopez McAllister



Clifton Lopez (married Ruth from Rome, GA) lived in Kansas in the 40's. He was a Minster and educator. He was a high school principal in Chattanooga and later became President of a Seminary in Kansas City. He had one daughter, Maude. In his declining years he was a recruiter for the Baptist church. He died around 1955.

Alice McAllister

Alice 1876- oldest daughter (school teacher) married John Williamson who was a very wealthy cotton farmer in Miss. When bad weather destroyed crops, the family subsequently moved to Memphis, Tenn. and had four children:

Juanita V. Williamson (1917-1993) Professor of English at LeMoyne-Owen College and consultant, adviser to many other universities. She was recognized for her outstanding contributions and listed in Two Thousand Notable American Women, Who's Who of American Women, Who's Who in the Word, Who's Who in the South and Southeast and American Women in Business and Education.

Emma Ruth Williamson Johnson- (1910-1996) Born in Shelby, Miss but the family moved to Memphis, Tenn where Emma attended the Memphis City Schools. Short term employment called her to Cleveland, Ohio as a secretary and Washington DC where she was a file clerk during World War II. In 1953, Emma began a twenty nine career as a schoolteacher with the Memphis city Schools.

Harvey M. Williamson (1908-1995) Also born in Shelby, Miss and attended school there and in New Orleans. He came to Cleveland, Ohio in 1924 and was the predecessor to Jessie Owens, as the one hundred yard dash man on the track. In 1962 he was elected a member of Western Reserve's Board of Governors where he served for six years. He was a Life Member of the NAACP. For more than 30 years he was married to the late Katharine P. Williamson, Chief of the Division of Social Administration for the State of Ohio and a well known social worker.

Sarah (married John Collins-who was a Pullman porter) had two children, Orleans Rico of Pittsburgh, and John Jr.


Hattie & Georgia McAllister 1880-


Died at age 17 during a tooth extraction.

Harvey James McAllister 1874 - 1954




He remarried to Ms. Edna Pickens. They had four children, Harveyette, Kermit, Winfred, and Norma.

William A. McAllister (In Person)



Orlean Collins Ricco



Born in Aberdeen, Mississippi, she was the daughter of Sara McAllister Collins and John Collins and was married to Louie Ricco. The Hill District was Orlean Ricco's home for 85 of her 89 years. For more than half a century, she lived in the same house on Dinwiddie Street, but her travels took her to Russia, South America, and Europe, and over the years she has counted among her many friends poet Langston Hughes and theologian Howard Thurman. Her vision helped to define the meaning of social work in Western Pennsylvania.


Orlean Collins Ricco

Born in Aberdeen, Mississippi, she was the daughter of Sara McAllister and John Collins and was married to Louie Ricco. The Hill District was Orlean Ricco's home for 85 of her 89 years. For more than half a century, she lived in the same house on Dinwiddie Street, but her travels took her to Russia, South America, and Europe, and over the years she has counted among her many friends poet Langston Hughes and theologian Howard Thurman. Her vision helped to define the meaning of social work in Western Pennsylvania. A graduate of Fifth Avenue High School and the University of Pittsburgh (Class of 1929), she was a case worker and home visitor during the Depression for the Mothers' Assistance Fund and Children and Family Services. After receiving the Master of Social Work (MSW) degree from the University of Pittsburgh in 1944, she headed a series of social service agencies. She ended her professional career as Magee-Womens Hospital's first director of social work, a position from which she retired in 1974. Orlean was committed to racial justice and dignified services for the poor. She was a founder of the undergraduate chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha at the University of Pittsburgh and of the Pittsburgh Urban League Guild. In the 1970s and '80s, she served as a board member of Comprehensive Health Planning Association, the Urban League and Lemington Center. She received the 25-year Equal Opportunity Award from the Urban League in 1983 and the YWCA Racial Justice Award in 1993. In an interview with the Post-Gazette, Mrs. Ricco told the reporter that she had remained in the Hill District because "one of the ways" of stabilizing a community is not to desert it." She recognized then that age might eventually force her to move to "an apartment or a nursing home." (That move came in 1994.) "It's inevitable," she added, "but we don't need to be afraid, even of death."



Vincent Broxton McAllister was born in Mobile, Alabama on April 20, 1906, where he lived for approximately 15 years. Mack married Celestine Lucille Williams in September of 1947 at the ages of 41 and 25 respectively. Their union produced three children, Terry (1954), Kay (1955) and Patrick (1958). Mack loved all kids and really gave his kids much love and attention. Before marrying Celestine, Mack owned a small grocery store and managed a chain of movie theaters on Church St. in Norfolk. He eventually bought another business called the "Uptown Peanut Shop" which he and his wife ran together. During lean years Mack became a merchant seaman, leaving his wife at home to run the family business while he sailed the high seas. He retired from the sea in 1965 when he was 60 years of age and spent the rest of his life managing the Uptown Peanut Shop. Mack had many friends all over the United States. He and Celestine loved to travel, see friends and MLB games. Mack was a man of wisdom, acquired mostly from his travels and hard times during his teenage years. He was a devoted husband and a loving and attentive father. He had a great sense of humor and was always much fun to be around. He was generous with his finances; giving to many non-profit organizations. He died from lung cancer on May 21, 1984. He now has a total of seven grandchildren. Kay Williams (husband George) produced the first three (Terri Craft, Kelley Craft, Jasmine Williams), followed by Patrick (wife Sheila) whose two boys came next (Harvey McAllister, Keenen McAllister, Kirah McAllister) and Terry (husband E.L.) the oldest of Mack's children who produced the next to the last grandchild (Vincent McAllister James).

George McAllister




George McAllister was born in Mobile, Alabama on April 20, 1906. He moved to California, and then Honolulu, where he lived most of his life.

She was involved at all levels of teaching. At the college level she served as an administrator, instructor of prospective teachers and supervised practice teachers. She was a Delta Sigma Theta in the early years of the Atlanta Chapter. She has a son James H. Owens, Jr., and daughters Aline O. Young and Janie O. Peters.

Harveyette McAllister Taylor was a lifelong member of the Franklin Street Baptist Church and went to St. Peter Claver more than most Catholics. She was also charter member of the local chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority. Ms Mac, as she was known to generations of students in Mobile, taught at Dunbar Junior High School. She retired in 1978 after 39 years in Mobile County School System. Accompanying Tia in Mobile included the constant greeting of "Hey Ms. Mac, remember me, you taught me in 9th grade in 1929." Tia loved her family, friends, and animals. She had a particular penchant for cats, including Smokey I, Smokey II, Smokey III (ad infinitum). Her passion for teaching extended beyond school. During the summers she implemented mandatory reading programs and summer school for any nieces and nephews nearby, and demanded a work ethic of excellence. Being with Tia always seemed to turn into a reading and writing exercise, ending with writing a letter to someone. She was preceded in death by her husband, Richard Taylor.

Kermit McAllister



Winston Kermit McAllister completed his undergraduate work at tiny Talladega College where he received a full scholarship and graduated while he was still in his young teens. He had all but achieved his doctorate at the University of Michigan when the Army called him to serve during World War II.

For three years, he was in the Quartermaster Corps, which he served in Europe and which enabled him to study briefly at the University of Paris under an armed forces program.

In 1946, he went to Howard University as an instructor, leaving for one semester to complete his PhD at Michigan by the time he was approaching his 20's. In 1947 he met his wife, Frances Jones of Springfield, MA, and the following year they married. Dr McAllister or "Tubbits" as he was affectionately known to many family members was a Professor of Philosophy at Howard. He had two children;

Kathleen and Winston.

Norma Elaine was born to Harvey James McAllister and Edna Louise Pickens McAllister on 6 July 1922 in Mobile, younger sister to E. Harveyette and Winston K., older sister of James W.

Her primary and secondary education was entirely within the Alabama public school system through high school. Norma briefly attended Talladega College and later transferred to Knoxville College where she received her B.A. and met her future husband, Thomas H. Kerr, Jr. of Baltimore, MD.

They were married in June of 1943 in Washington, DC. and had two children, Thomas Henderson III and Judith Elaine.

Norma Elaine McAllister

Norma Elaine was born to Harvey James McAllister and Edna Louise Pickens McAllister on 6 July 1922 in Mobile, younger sister to E. Harveyette and Winston K., older sister of James W. Her primary and secondary education was entirely within the Alabama public school system through high school. Norma briefly attended Talladega College and later transferred to Knoxville College where she received her B.A. and where she met her future husband, Thomas H. Kerr, Jr. of Baltimore, MD. Norma moved to Washington, DC and worked for a time at the Department of the Interior while Thomas started as a piano instructor at the Howard University School of Music (and later became professor and head of the Piano Department). They were married in June of 1943 in Washington, DC. Thomas Henderson III was born on 9 November 1945 and Judith Elaine was born 10 July 1950. Norma helped implement and participated weekly in one of the earliest student hot lunch programs within the D. C. public schools in 1954-1956, while her children were enrolled in elementary school. Once both children were far enough along in school, Norma returned to work in the DC Public School System as a Pupil Personnel Worker. During this time, she also earned her M.A. from Catholic University. Throughout her lifetime, she was always very active in her children's Parent Teacher Associations, as community block leader/organizer, as an active member of Plymouth Congregational Church (where Thomas Jr. was organist and choir director), and was an active member of the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority. In her spare time, she enjoyed gardening and participating in bridge, canasta, and pinochle tournaments (where she was singularly talented and frequently emerged as the winner). Norma's son, Thomas H. Kerr III, married Aniece Ragland of Anniston, AL on 5 July of 1975 and they live in Lexington, MA. They have two sons, Thomas Henderson Kerr, IV (born 14 June 1978) and Stephen McAllister Kerr (born 7 January 1980). Norma died on 14 December 1991.

James Winfred Alfonso McAllister



James Winfred Alfonso McAllister (1924-1979) was born in Mobile and attended public schools. He then went to Hampton University where he majored in Agriculture. Later he served as a private in the U.S.Army. He attended Howard University School of Law where he met Ann Elizabeth Hughes from Baltimore, Maryland who was an Art Major at the same school. They had four children, Singleton Beryl, Donna Edna Olsa, James W.A. Jr. (Jay) and Leslie Ann.

He was also known affectionately as Wint and Mac, was appointed Assistant United States Attorney in Baltimore. He ran for public office for the City Counsel. He was an extraordinary litigator and is still recognized for his exceptional court room skills.
